What the texts say — and why it's hard to dismiss

The ancient Indian epics do not gesture vaguely at flight. They describe vimanas — flying machines — with a specificity that unsettles modern readers: craft that take off and land, that travel great distances, that carry passengers and, in the darker passages, weapons.

The evidence problem, stated honestly

Here is where we part ways with the sensationalists. The viral claim that “an ancient vimana was unearthed in 2012” does not survive scrutiny — and we say so plainly. Separating a genuine textual mystery from internet legend is the entire discipline of hidden history.

So the honest scorecard reads: the textual descriptions are real, detailed, and old. A physical vimana has never been recovered. Both of those things are true at once, and an explorer holds them both.
